My journey started at school. I discovered my love of design during work experience when I was in Year 10 with a local graphic design firm. They offered me an apprenticeship, and after getting a lot of advice from friends and family I made the tough decision to leave school.

I was receiving great marks at school and my careers advisor was strongly urging me to not to leave - but I'm so glad I didn't listen. I have never regretted my decision.

During my apprenticeship I was busy completing TAFE courses, teaching part time and spent most of my spare time training to represent Australia at the WorldSkills International Competition, where I won a gold medal for Web Design.

My TAFE courses were of such a high standard and helped me further my knowledge with up to date content, and ultimately gave me the skills to set up my business. Nowadays one of the hardest things I do is recruit staff.

I learnt a lot of real industry knowledge which has really helped me be able to set up my business.
